## TinyURL

<http://tinyurl.com/>

Cut-and-paste a really long URL into the box on TinyURL's site and the site automatically smushes the URL into a shorter, permanent one that is much easier to share with others. [All of the longer URLs in this handout have been shortened using TinyURL.]

## Intel Broadband Download Calculator

An essential tool for web developers, educators who use BlackBoard or WebCT, or anyone with a dial-up connection. Use your mouse enter a particular file's size and the site automatically shows you how long it will take to download that file over various connection speeds.

## Broadband Reports Speed Test

Want to know how fast your internet connection *really* is? Using a simple JAVA applet, this site both downloads and uploads some simple test files of various sizes to determine your computer's true connection speed.

## Mail2Web

Want to read your email on the road but don't have access to Outlook, Eudora, Netscape, etc? Just go to mail2web.com, key in your email address and password [yes, the site is secure], and up pops your POP3 or IMAP inbox.

## Slashdot

A constantly-updated, online community that offers the latest news, reviews, and commentary about technology in general and information technology in specific. Expect to see a LOT of articles you won't understand... but Slashdot is still worth the trip, especially if you want to stay up to date with what is REALLY going on in the tech world.

## Gizmodo

A constantly-updated collection of stories and reviews about the latest must-have gadgets. Gizmodo is a little like Slashdot with pictures. The site/blog offers one paragraph snippets of gadget information from other sources along with links to where you can find more information about a particular tech product or issue. [Top 10 blog]

## Engadget

Created by Gizmodo founder Peter Rojas, Engadget also offers one paragraph snippets of gadget news and reviews with links to more in-depth coverage. The site also offers an extremely popular weekly tech news podcast. [Top 10 blog]

## WOOT

Updated daily at Midnight Central Time, Woot sells one name brand electronics item a day at insanely cheap prices [hence the site's "one day, one deal" motto.] The only catch is that Woot has severely limited quantities. You snooze, you lose.

## BoingBoing

Written with a wry sense of humor and created by five contributing writers for Wired magazine, BoingBoing is a frequently updated blog that focuses on technology, futurism, science fiction, Disney, intellectual property, and politics. [Top 10 blog]

## Digg

Don't have time to surf the net? Let other people surf for you. Digg is a social bookmarking site where people submit new stories and websites and then Digg users vote on whether the submissions should be promoted to the front page. Digg is a great way to keep up-to-date with the most popular internet sites and stories of the day.

### **Rubistar**

### **US Institutional Accreditation System**

### **Standards for Success**

Created by the Association of American Universities [with the assistance of the Pew Charitable Trusts], this site offers a free report specifically identifying what students need to know and be able to do in order to succeed in entry-level courses at America's research universities. The report is so significant that The College Board uses it as a foundational element in the development of College Board examinations, including the SAT, PSAT, and Advanced Placement exams.

### **Lynda.com (\*\*NOT FREE!\*\*)**

For \$25 a month you can access 10,000 online training movies that show you how to use Dreamweaver, Fireworks, Flash, Photoshop, Quicktime, etc. If you can't afford \$25 a month, check out the free movies that are updated weekly.

### **Google Maps**

Google's MapQuest. Key in an address and Google shows you that address on a zoomable, draggable map. You can also view that address from space with or without an overlay showing street names.

### **KCRW**
